Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Opening Statement

"Tonight's meeting is being live-streamed by Chelmsford Telemedia and posted to the CPS website for interested community members to access and watch. Although we are not allowing for in-person public participation, interested community members are encouraged to submit their names and addresses to Superintendent Lang if they would like to participate remotely under the public input portion of our meeting. During our public input session anyone who has joined us through the *gotomeeting* platform and expressed interest in making a comment will be recognized by the Superintendent and allowed to speak with The Committee. If anyone watching this meeting live has questions or comments to share they are encouraged to email one of us during the meeting. We will read those questions or comments during our second public input session at the end of the meeting."

The Chair welcomed all to the meeting.

Consent Agenda

1. Approval of the minutes of the regular school committee meeting of December 1, 2020.

Ms. Newcomb motioned for the school committee to accept the minutes of the regular school committee meeting of December 1, 2020. Mr. Moses seconded. Motion carries 5-0.

Good News

Dr. Hirsch said that the student representatives are willing to attend future meetings virtually to provide CHS updates. During this holiday season live student concerts are not an option so past concert highlights are available on Chelmsford Telemedia and on The District's Facebook page.

Public Comments

None.

New Business

1. Presentation: CHS Innovation Pathways Program

Jon Morris, Science Curriculum Coordinator, Stephanie Quinn, Social Studies and Social Sciences Coordinator, and Marilyn Sweeney, Technology Coordinator, joined the meeting virtually to present highlights of this program. The slide show presented is included in tonight's agenda packet and may also be viewed along with the complete presentation on Chelmsford Telemedia You/Tube. They received a \$22,500 grant recently to help fund plans so the program will be in place for the 2021/22 school year. The program focuses on careers that are in high-demand in Massachusetts. Students will be provided with training and experience internships in these industries through partnership with local businesses. This will allow students to be career and college ready sooner than in the past. The pathways for the next school year will focus on business and finance as well as information technology. Each student will be required to complete two technical courses and two advanced courses, which are already offered at CHS. A presentation will be given to eighth grade students this spring. The program will be available to all students at CHS.

2. Presentation: Technology Update

Bill Silver, Director of Technology, joined the meeting virtually to provide updates. His update and accompanying document were shared on the screen and may be found in tonight's agenda packet. He began by expressing gratitude to all members of his department for their "amazing" work this school year. Among the updates he highlighted are: additional Classroom Clear Touch Panels (close to 200 panels are in instructional spaces in schools throughout the district); web cameras to facilitate hybrid/remote learning; licensing was obtained for Google Enterprise which allows for break out rooms and polling for sessions; additional bandwidth (helps accommodate simultaneous Google Meets and receive data reports); and 1:1 Chromebooks for students entering grades 5 and 9 and over 3,000 additional Chromebooks from dismantled in-school carts were given to students to use at home and additional funding was received to purchase 3,000 more new Chromebooks. Security updates were installed at CHS and Westlands. Additional cabling in schools and outdoor WiFi will be completed by the spring which will enable classes to meet more frequently outside the buildings. The Help Request and Inventory systems were also upgraded this summer, which has allowed over 6,000 help tickets to be closed since mid-August! Enhanced technology integration and professional development was required for all staff to be able to offer instruction needed by way of the hybrid and remote learning models. Ten full PD days were offered before school resumed in September. This is ongoing to meet the developing needs of all the staff as well as students. The technology integration specialists in each school continue to offer PD learning opportunities daily! In addition, live assistance is available through Zoom on Wednesdays, when all students and staff are remote. "Tips and Tricks for 2020" are also posted on the CPS website. By the beginning of the 2021/22 school year all students in grade levels 5 through 12 will have 1:1 devices! The School Committee members expressed their appreciation for the hard work and successes of the technology department.

3. Presentation: HVAC Assessment Report

Dr. Lang shared that this fall, due to COVID-19, the Town and CPS embarked on an assessment of all HVAC systems. Tonight's agenda packet includes details regarding this and several of the people involved are attending this meeting virtually to bring The Committee up-to-date on what has taken place and to, also, present plans for the HVAC systems moving forward. CMTA is the company in charge of the assessment and recommendations. Jess Farber, from CMTA joined the meeting to present highlights of the HVAC assessment and shared his slide show with the meeting attendees and the public. To fully appreciate this technical and detailed presentation, you should go to Chelmsford Telemedia/YouTube to

view it. Testing and balancing as recommended will begin by January and should be completed by February school vacation and then will be continuously monitored, so that issues will be addressed quickly.

New Business # 6. Vote to Accept Donation: Makerspace at Parker Middle School (Taken out of order.)

Jon Morris, Science Curriculum Coordinator joined the meeting to virtually to speak about this generous donation. Materials provided were recommended by Mr. Morris, based on previous experience, and by Parker Middle School students and staff. In the spring Dr. Parks will join Mr. Morris to update The Committee on this project.

Ms. Newcomb motioned for The School Committee to approve the gift donation of \$6,000 from the Fichtenbaum Family as presented in the spreadsheet for purchases provided by Mr. Morris. Mr. Moses seconded. Motion carries 5-0.

4. Recommended FY2021 Budget Transfers

Ms. Newcomb motioned for The School Committee vote to approve the FY2021 local operating budget transfer of \$ 6,998 from the salary reserve lane change account to the one labor account as presented. Mr. Moses seconded. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carries 5-0.

5. CHS Winter Sports Update

Included in tonight's agenda packet is an update from Dan Hart, Athletic Director, showing that some winter sports are in flux due to COVID. Some traditional winter sports will take place later in the school year. What will be offered are: boys' and girls' basketball; hockey; ski; girls' gymnastics team and boys' swimming team. There are modifications in these sports due to the pandemic. Tryouts begin this week. In the event that, The District goes to fully remote learning, The Committee would need to vote on whether sports should continue. It was agreed to have further discussion on this subject at the next meeting.

6. Vote to Accept Donation: Makerspace at Parker Middle School

(Addressed earlier in tonight's meeting.)

7. 2021 MCAS Assessment and ACCESS Schedule Update

Dr. Hirsch included a memorandum in tonight's packet which addresses the status of MCAS and ACCESS test planning. Originally DESE scheduled MCAS testing for January 2021. Testing for high school juniors has been pushed out until the spring. Seniors will need to be tested in January. ACCESS testing for ELL students will still be held in January as scheduled. Principal Murray is waiting for a date for PSAT testing.

8. FY2022 Capital Plan Update

Dr. Lang presented the projects for consideration this past Thursday. The next meeting will be this coming Thursday. No further action is required tonight.

9. Tri-Board Budgetary Meeting: Monday, January 11, 2021 at 7:00 p.m.

Ms. Santos said that the Harrington PTO met and had their holiday sale in collaboration with Byam, which was successful. McCarthy's PTO shared that their recycle sale went extremely well. Activities for the school will be starting soon. They are hoping to present a student activity that can be done virtually by the entire student body. CHS will be sponsoring a "grab and go" for staff this week. The amount of parent donations for this was amazing. Raffles will also take place during this event.

Ms. Newcomb shared that the Chelmsford Friends of Music will meet this Thursday via Zoom.





Re: October 1, 2020 Student Enrollment Report

We supplied the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) with our October 1, 2020 student enrollment data which is in the process of being certified by DESE. This enrollment information, once certified, forms the basis for the FY22 Chapter 70 state aid calculation. Based on the data supplied to DESE, I have prepared the attached spreadsheet displaying the overall district enrollment by grade level in the top section of the report and then further breakdown the enrollment by grade and school below in the sections that follow. For each of the elementary and middle schools I have incorporated the number of mainstream homerooms into the spreadsheet to produce an average class size for grades 1 through 8. I am working with Chelmsford High School to review the individual class rosters to produce a similar class size report for review with the upcoming FY22 budget deliberations.

It is difficult to draw conclusions this year due to the artificially lower enrollment than in a normal school year. We have had a number of students unenroll this year due to the COVID 19 pandemic as families have either sought private or parochial school options for their child(ren), elected to homeschool, or deferred enrollment (in the case of Kindergarten students) to the 2021/22 school year. Overall, we enrolled and reported 193 less students in the current 2020/21 school year than we enrolled and reported last year in the 2019/20 school year. What effect this will have on FY22 Chapter 70 and other state aid remains to be seen. This is not a situation unique to Chelmsford, it is anticipated the state will invoke a "hold harmless" provision regarding state education aid, ultimately providing no less than the amount of state aid in FY22 as districts received in FY21. We are watching this closely as we develop the FY22 recommended budget.

Re: CHS Winter Athletics

At our last school committee meeting I provided you with an overview of the planned winter sports season at Chelmsford High School (CHS). Tryouts were held in December and teams have been practicing over the holiday break for the start of competition to begin no earlier than January 11, 2021. Safeguards are in place, as are modifications to each of the sports, to enable our teams to safely practice and compete against our MVC opponents.

In the event we find ourselves in a fully remote learning situation at CHS during the winter season, the school committee will need to vote to either allow our teams to compete in or suspend MVC competitions. As discussed at our last meeting, I would like to allow our student athletes to practice and compete if it is safe to do so. Throughout the fall, MVC superintendents met on a weekly basis to review community COVID data and determine whether scheduled weekly competitions should occur based upon COVID conditions in the individual communities scheduled for competition. This will continue throughout the winter season if our schools are in session. On a week-to-week basis a decision will be made about our ability to compete against our MVC colleagues.

If at some point we need to close CHS due to COVID spread within our school community, I would recommend we cease competition(s) until we return to school, and it is safe to once again compete. Alternately, if we need to close CHS due to staffing or some other reason not directly related to COVID spread within our school community, I may recommend to the school committee that our athletic teams be allowed to continue with scheduled competitions. At that time, the school committee would need to vote to either allow CHS teams to compete in scheduled competitions or suspend competitions. The school committee may preemptively vote to support such a recommendation. Either way, I believe it's important to have this conversation ahead of time for planning purposes.



Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS)







Attached please find an e-mail communication from John Sousa, Town of Chelmsford Finance Director/Treasurer, pertaining to the FY2022 capital plan recommendations that were approved by the Capital Planning Committee and will be submitted to Town Meeting in April for funding approval.

Seven (7) capital projects submitted by the school department for consideration totaling \$ 1.636 million were recommended for funding approval. These projects comprise the top 7 of 8 prioritized capital projects submitted for consideration in FY22. The eighth project, HVAC ductwork repair/service was not recommended for approval, however the school committee's capital plan representative, Mr. Jeff Doherty, requested and it was agreed that the work would be reviewed and a firm estimate of the repair cost be developed and provided as part of the HVAC scope of work DPW is currently contracting in the schools. If possible, the identified deficiencies and/or repairs will be incorporated into the DPW HAVC project scope of work.

Good Morning:

Please find a copy attached of the FY22 Capital Improvement Plan recommendation that was approved at our virtual meeting last night. This plan will be presented to the Select Board, School Committee, and Finance Committee at the Tri-Board meeting on Monday evening, January 11th. Finally, the FY22 Capital Budget will be presented to Town Meeting in April 2021 for consideration and approval.

The Committee reviewed 34 projects totaling just over \$6.2M. 24 projects were recommended for funding in FY22. Of those 24 projects, three were approved at a reduced funding level. Nine projects were deferred and one project was withdrawn. The Committee voted to recommend the total amount financed to not exceed \$3,893,974. After deducting a \$75,000 contribution from the Child Care Revolving Fund for a portion of the Westlands Community Education Center Kitchen renovation, the net amount to be financed through municipal bonds is \$3,818,974.

Thank you to our citizen members as well as members representing the School Committee, Finance Committee, and Board of Library Trustees for volunteering your time to assist with the development of the Town's annual capital budget. The attendance of our Select Board Liaison, Virginia Crocker-Timmins, at all meetings is appreciated.

Attached please find a report provided by Ms. Sue Rosa, Manager of Healthcare Services, with the Town of Chelmsford Board of Health, related to usage of the INTERFACE services contracted between the Town of Chelmsford, Board of Health and Chelmsford School Department.

The INTERFACE service contract has been provided by the Town for the past nine (9) years and is split funded between the three entities. The data suggests the primary usage continues to be for individuals dealing with anxiety and depression, which we are very aware that services are in high demand in this area. Further, suicidal ideation remains a real concern. The Board of Health is working with the schools and other community partners to bring education and programs into the schools as well as the community to raise awareness of this problem and to help with prevention strategies.







Our hope is that these efforts, and your partnership, will continue to raise awareness and usage of the service within your community while also breaking down the stigma surrounding mental health. This is especially important now, when we know many may not know where to turn to seek help and guidance for emotional wellness.


In terms of trends in your community, the service continues to be utilized more for youth (31) than adults (14). Most callers continued to hear about the service through the schools, though a significant number this period were repeat callers (11) perhaps indicating they found the service helpful in the past and utilized it again for a new service or for a dependent. A continued trend this reporting period was that most referrals noted their race as White, followed by other races and ethnicities in smaller numbers. Most callers identified their gender as female again this reporting period.


Again, this reporting period most callers requested referrals for Individual Therapy followed by Medication Evaluation/Prescribing. Last reporting period, we have added COVID-19 as a presenting concern, with 9 callers either indicating this as the primary reason for their call or indicating that it is exacerbating other existing mental health concerns. As in most communities, the majority of callers from your community were seeking help for Anxiety (24) and/or Depression (14). Of note, there was a significant increase in callers reporting Suicidal Ideation (8) currently or in the recent past.











