COURSE DESCRIPTION

Sociology is strongly recommended for college bound students. It is designed to aid students in today's dynamic and rapidly changing world. This course has been developed to show the complexity of social life with its interconnections between social events and conditions. It includes a study of major social institutions, socializations, social stratification, and the relationship of the personality problems of youth to these social forces. Through a series of discussions, experiments, research, and projects students explore examples of the sorts of problems sociologists study and their methods of trying to alleviate those problems.
